Believed to be Maryland's largest county fair fairgrounds operated solely by volunteers, the Association annually recruits hundreds of friends, family members, and community organizations to ensure its successful production. These dedicated volunteers

donate thousands of hours and dollars each year to continue the Association's mission of improving agriculture, increasing public awareness of our agricultural community, and educating the general public on agricultural and home arts skills.

The only constant in history is change. But history shapes the future, no matter the circumstances; the past will always sculpt the future. Moakley Mattingly has come to represent to me everything that St. Mary's County was and often I feel as though that part has been lost. I've never seen films at the new Theater, I've never seen anyone walking into Duke's on Sunday mornings, and I've never seen a boat launch or the slag barge at Leonardtown Wharf. But at the same time, I can see the old Movie board over Cerre



Grande, I can see a faded sign over Café Des Artistes, and now Leonardtown Wharf has been revamped and renovated to where those memories can be resurrected, where they can live. We only need know the history of where


we come from to be connected to it. More so it is our duty to learn the history of where we come from to be connected to it. More so Leonardtown Beacon it is our duty to learn it so as

to grow, not to be limited by our past, but to use it as a foundation. In that way we become better people, a better county and a better nation. I implore you not to forget where you came because then meaning can be given to those who were

be given to those who were before us. Simply by remembering this Tricentennial of Leonardtown, we are all cognizant of this one past, and in this moment, despite the vast differences of every individual, we are unified. This connection of souls, is our history. My history is seeing Moakley Street and Singletree and knowing where these names came from, who the people are behind the names. So even though I might never see or speak to you again, we have both come to share this history, more than dates and places, but people. So this Tricentennial of Leonardtown isn't homage to the Square or even to the Wharf, but rather the memories of those who have lived and died there. This place is a testament to Moakley Mattingly, to every person you remember, and all those who remember us and this day. We are not

confined to this moment, or any other future moment, because we have the future. The future is what we make it, and above all, when we make it, I ask you to remember our history and remember Leonardtown.



Leonardtown Winery Moves Forward

On June 10, 2008 a Memorandum of Understanding was finalized between the St. Mary's County Commissioners and the Commissioners of Leonardtown regarding establishment of a winery in Leonardtown. The project will provide local grape growers an opportunity to process their crops to produce local wine. The winery will be located on Rt. 5 at the Port of Leonardtown, where the Town is also developing a public park along McIntosh Run. The site was an old SHA facility with access off of Rt. 243, Newtowne Neck Road.

Local grape growers have formed a cooperative, Southern Maryland Winegrowers, which will operate the facility once the construction is complete. The project is slated for opening in Fall of 2009.

for vehicle and pedestrian functions, and provide aesthetic enhancements to improve commercial viability and quality of life along the corridor of Washington Street and Fenwick Street. 



Tornado Preparedness

Citizens are urged to be both aware and prepared for weather emergencies, particularly tornado events. If there is a Tornado Warning for any area in St. Mary's County, the county's Emergency Communications staff will activate Fire & Rescue Sirens with a Take Cover signal. The Tornado Warning signal will last for 13 cycles, making it significantly different from a fire or rescue call signal. Please be aware of the monthly system test on the first Saturday of every month at noon, and do not confuse it with an actual Tornado Warning. Familiarize yourself with the terms that are used to identify a tornado hazard:

- * A Tornado means a tornado is possible in your area. You should monitor NOAA Weather Radio, local radio and television news outlets for the latest developments.
- * A Tornado means a tornado has been sighted and is actually occurring. You should take shelter in a basement or center room of your home, immediately. Vehicles and mobile homes are not considered safe during tornadic conditions.

Mosquito Control

With the wet spring, these pesky little insects are bound to breed and bite! The Town, in cooperation with the Maryland Department of Agriculture, provides mosquito spray services for its residents and businesses within its corporate limits. The Mosquito Control Program relies on surveys and monitoring of the larval and adult mosquito populations to coordinate control activities. Control techniques include breeding source reduction, public education, biological control and insecticide applications. Obey The Posted Speed Limits

In an attempt to reduce traffic accidents and slow speeding drivers, our Town Deputy, Steve Simonds, will randomly place a VMS Board and conduct laser operations throughout the Town. Areas of greatest concentration will be along Washington Street into the downtown and on Point Lookout Road between the intersections of Route 243 and Route 245. Be aware of, and obey posted speed limits. You not only avoid a citation and fine, but travel along our highways will be safer and the occurrence of life-threatening accidents will be lessened.

Trash Pickup and Recycling Reminders

Residential trash is collected every Tuesday and Friday. Trash is accepted in 30-gallon cans with lids, cans on wheels, or toters issued by Goode Trash Removal. To guarantee collection, trash

should be set out the night before or by 6:00 a.m. on the day of pick-up. Bagged leaves set out by Town residents will also be picked up on regularly scheduled collection days, but is limited to 5 bags per household, per collection day. Town residents wishing further information on Leonardtown trash service, or to obtain a container, contact the Town Office

The next quarterly **bulk trash** pickup dates will be on Friday, September 5th and Friday, December 5th. Bulk trash will be collected at the same time as your regular trash, so please ensure all your items are placed at the curb together.

Residential recycling pickup of old newspapers, glass bottles, jars, metal and aluminum cans, and approved plastic bottles is made on Thursdays. To guarantee collection, your recycling tote should be set out the night before or by 6:00 a.m. the day of pick-up. Remember to make recycling a part of your daily routine. Normal trash and recycling pickups will be made during the week of the Labor Day holiday. For further information on trash service, recycling, or to obtain a recycling container, contact the Town Office at 301-475-9791.

Change in Utility Charges

On or about September 30th, utility customers will receive the first quarterly bill for fiscal year 2009. On April 14, 2008, the Town Council approved revised rates for water and sewer services. Residential sewer rates will increase from \$90.54 to \$92.10 per quarter, and water rates will increase from \$42.20 to \$43.04 per quarter.

Water charges for commercial customers are based on actual metered usage, and the water rates for commercial customers were also increased by 2%. The sewer rate for commercial customers is \$92.10 per equivalent dwelling unit.

Trash service charges are in the process of being calculated. Those rates will be posted to the Town's website as soon as available.

cars, trucks, and the excitement of kids catching candy thrown from decorated floats, who can blame them? Numerous activities and entertainment round out the day, including the jousting tournament, 4-H livestock auction, and the heavy weight horse pull.

Sunday is family day. This is your chance to show the world your little one in the annual Baby Contest, listen to gospel music and enjoy the horse show. As the Fair comes to a close, exhibitors arrive to retrieve their goods and volunteers begin cleanup while pondering thoughts about the next year's Fair.

Many of the SMC Fair volunteers have served on the Board of Directors over 50 years. Since its inception in 1947, the office of Fair Board President has changed hands 16 times. Taking the position in 1984, John Richards makes 2008 his 25th year as the Board's president. Members of the SMC Fair Board manage the Fairgrounds all year Last year, over 50,000 people attended the SMC Fair. An additional

40,000 people are expected on the fairgrounds as the Association hosts other major St. Mary's County events annually, including Friends of the Library Book Sale, Christmas in April, Cole Brothers Circus, SMC Spring Festival, SMC Crab Festival, So. Md. Livestock Expo, Freedom Fest, Cub Scout Week, SMC Oyster Festival, Shop With a Cop, and monthly Rabies Clinics offered by SMAWL.



Revenues received by the SMC Fair Association include a grant from the Maryland Department of Agriculture, carnival operations, admissions, and rental fees. These revenues support costs of the fair, which include building maintenance, grounds upkeep, electricity, sewer, and premium awards. The most recent building projects include the farm building, arts & crafts building, and auditorium. Construction of the new auditorium was accomplished through a partnership of the SMC Fair Association and the Dr. James Forrest Career and Technology Center.

The St. Mary's County Fair is a treasure chest of priceless gems, shining with a brilliance of what it represents - opportunities to learn about and preserve our agricultural heritage and its relevancy to our life today. As the basic traditions of our early agricultural heritage are

fading away, it is important to recollect the industrious work of our ancestors. A visit to the SMC Fair will rekindle memories and assure that many facets of the "simple life", like sewing, home cooking. gardening, horseback riding, and raising cattle and swine, still exist in our world today. Perhaps you're a regular St. Mary's County Fair volunteer, participant, or visitor -maybe you've visited at least once in your lifetime -- or perhaps 2008 will be your first visit -- when the day is done, you'll be glad you came, and when you return each year, you will still see the same community pride and some of the same volunteers time and time again!



A Brief History of the Fair in St. Mary's County

A snapshot of the history of the Fair in St. Mary's County reveals that the first County Fair was developed by the Xaverian Brothers in 1912, and held on the grounds of the Leonard Hall School property in Leonardtown for several years. Following an apparent period of lapse, the St. Mary's County Fair Association, Inc. was established in 1947. The County Fair was then held on the grounds of Camp Calvert on Breton Bay in Leonardtown (now St. Mary's Ryken High School). The grounds for today's SMC Fair are simply referred to "The Fairgrounds", a parcel of property on MD Route 5 (Point Lookout Road) two miles south of downtown Leonardtown. These grounds have been home to the SMC Fair since 1949, when the St Mary's County Government leased the land to the SMC Fair Association for the purpose of building a permanent home for the SMC Fair. For a time, there were two SMC Fair organizations. In 1949, the first Black Fair was held at the Cardinal Gibbons High School in Ridge. The Black Fair later moved to the Bernard Somerville property in Loveville, and then in the 1950's to the current Fairgrounds property, conducted on the subsequent week of the White Fair, until integration with the SMC Fair Association in the early 1960's. During its era, the Black Fair also provided public awareness and education of agriculture and home arts skills.

A comprehensive account of the St. Mary's County Fair can be found in "The Heritage—History of the St. Mary's County Fair, A County in Transition". The history and personal recollections in this book were compiled by the 1988-1989 Leonardtown High School publications students and sponsor. While copies of this fascinating book are limited, the SMC

Fair Association is currently working to incorporate it onto its web site.
