n 1634, Leonard Calvert and over 200 settlers aboard the ARK and DOVE ships, arrived at St. Clement's Island in Colton's Point, Maryland. The colonists then sailed to St. Mary's City to establish freedom and a new kind of life in America. In 1708, Philip Lynes, Mayor of

St. Mary's City, donated 50 acres of land to the colony to be laid as the county seat. The land was called Shepherd's Old Fields and was located at the head of Breton Bay, Seven commissioners were charged to lay out the town and set aside a new lot for a new County Courthouse, to be built at a cost not to exceed 12,000 lbs. of tobacco. On December 17, 1708, the area was chartered as

a Town and named Seymour Town in honor of Governor John Seymour, the then Governor of Maryland. In 1728, the town was renamed Leonard Town after Governor Benedict Leonard Calvert, the then Governor of Maryland. Leonardtown became an incorporated town in 1858, and is the only municipality in St. Mary's County.

The Town of Leonardtown served as a waterfront port that brought in steamships until the 1920's. The current Courthouse is in the same location as the Courthouse in 1708, and visitors can still see the original cannon from the ARK

which is mounted in front of the Old Jail Museum next to the Courthouse. While many changes have been made to the Town over the years, several landmarks and yesteryears' small town charm still exist today. Year 2008 marked a celebration of 300 years of Leonardtown's history. Since December 17th, 1708, Leonardtown has experienced change, growth and revitalization. The Town thanks the 300th Anniversary Committee members and

all who made the many facets of this Celebration possible. The Celebration was a huge success and many people experienced Leonardtown's history through the hard work and dedication of those serving on this committee. As the 300th Celebration concludes, we would like to highlight the activities and events throughout 2008 that commemorated this milestone event.

1 am constantly reminded of my childhood memories while growing up in Leonardtown. The Courthouse played a huge role in my life; my dad's office (Walter Dorsey) was right across the street, and my grandfather was circuit court judge. I would spend hours in the Courthouse quietly observing the proceedings of the court and my endless encounters with the likes of Dorothy Kucher, Mary Bell, Evelyn Arnold, Pearl Gamer and Mary Agnes Buckler gave me a new appreciation for women.

Outside of the Courthouse there were countless others working and/or running their own businesses. Miss Bessie Mattingly, Janice, Mrs. Blair, Mrs. Richardson, Regina Connelly, Virginia Duke, Grace Mattingly, Franny, Aggie, Fayrene and more. Then there were my teachers Sister Frances Miriam, Mrs. Aud, Mrs. Oliver, Sister Samuella, Mrs. Abell, Sister Ann Mildred, Sister Eunice Ann, and Sister Mary Eugene to name a few.

Today there is a completely new crop of women who listen, teach, own and operate businesses, mentor and most importantly foster a strong sense of caring and community pride. You are the new legion of Leonardtown's Legendary Ladies.

In future issues of the Beacon, we hope to highlight Leonardtown's past and present legendary ladies. We invite you to share your memories, submit your stories for consideration, and thank you for your continued support the jewel of St. Mary's our dear "Leonardtown."

My Early Memories of Growing Up In Leonardtown

After church on Sundays, the whole family would go to V&H Bakery and get fresh baked bread and glazed donuts . . . what a treat !! They also had the best ice cream ... a treat dad would buy us, when we were good, which was always ... LOL! V&H was located where Olde Towne Insurance is now.

Going to St. Mary's Academy . . . watching the nuns throw items at the Ryken boys when they drove down the lane, or they would look out the second floor window and write down the license plate numbers, then they would call the brothers at Ryken and report the license number to them . . . that was a kick. When we would leave school, while walking down the lane, we would roll up our uniform skirts to above our knees. The rule was the skirt was to be below our knee caps. By the time we would roll up our skirts we would have quite a waistline.

When you attended grade school, we would go to the pharmacy for a snack.

They had a big soda restaurant in the back. They had the best cherry coke or ice cream floats. It wasn't until you went to high school were you allowed to go to Bailey's Restaurant. The high school kids would taunt you if you went in without a parent present. As a high school student we would go to Bailey's several times a week and get French fries with gravy ... yummy. It was quite a social atmosphere ... they had slot machines too!! Bailey's was located where Corner Critters pet store is now.

Going to the movie theatre on a Sunday afternoon was a must. They had the best pop corn and these packages of very large M&M's that were irresistible. I wish I could remember the name of those M&M candies, they came in a package that was long and had about 15 in a package, the candy was about the size of a quarter.

After getting your driver's license, we would ride around the town square ... around and around and around. Then stop, park, socialize and back in the car and ride around and around that square. "Learch" was always leaning against the window in front of Dukes.

Leonardtown was a small town where everyone knew everyone . . . couldn't get away with much because someone would eventually tell your parents. We could walk to town within a few minutes and always find a ride home, if needed. Good times, good friends and wonderful memories.

Leonardtown to Install New Residential Water Meters

In recent years, development and drought have put strains on water supplies for many jurisdictions - not just in Maryland, but around the country. In November 2005, the State of Maryland required Leonardtown to submit its first Water Conservation Plan. This plan was a requirement by the Maryland Department of the Environment before Leonardtown was allowed to build a new well - a well that was required to ensure compliance with new federal limits on arsenic. The single most important component of this water conservation plan requires universal residential metering. Additionally, the State mandated update to the Leonardtown Comprehensive Plan will be required to include a Water Resources Element. There are many components of this element, one being to identify water conservation measures. It is incumbent upon local governments to ensure adequate supplies of drinking water, not just now, but to plan for future demand.

Currently, single family homes are charged a flat rate for water service regardless of the volume of water used. This is not conducive to creating a climate of conservation, as customers have no way of knowing how much water they use on a daily basis. As we implement water meter installations at all single family homes in Leonardtown, we believe efforts to conserve water will be enhanced, as customers will be aware of the amount of water they are using.

Installation of the meters commenced in January 2009 and will be done in phases throughout the year. It will be a costly and timeconsuming project. Delahay Construction, the Town's utility contractor, will be working under the supervision of Tony Wheatley, the Town's Capital Project Coordinator. Mr. Wheatley will be responsible for providing adequate advance notice to customers as to how the project will affect residents, and he will make every effort to meet with residents personally to discuss interruption of water service before it happens. Any questions or concerns regarding the water meter installation project should be addressed to Tony at 301-475-9791.

Leonardtown Residents 2008 Tax Returns

When completing your Maryland Income Tax return, please remember to check the "Municipality" box and write in "Leonardtown". This does not increase your taxes, but, thanks to you, it does ensure that the Town will receive its share of income taxes from the State of Maryland.

Permits Required for Home Repairs

During the spring and summer months, many residents begin making plans for their home improvement projects. Remember that building permits are required for sbeds, decks, swimming pools, piers, room additions and additional living space. Town residents should apply for and obtain a building permit at least two weeks before beginning their new and exciting additions! In some instances, approval may also be required from your homeowner's association before a building permit can be issued. Contact the Town Office for details.

We all need fresh air! Enjoy the scenery! Socialize! Walk around the Town Square and Leonardtown Wharf Park! Does Fido like to join you?



No problem! But, please! Be responsible and clean up and properly dispose of any waste left by your dog.

Pet waste is not only a nuisance, but it's also a health concern that contributes to the spread of parasites and possible disease. The Town will be enforcing the law and cracking down on this escalating problem by charging a \$50 fine to those who don't clean up their pet's waste. Do your part to promote neighborhood courtesy and keeping our Town grounds as sanitary and unsoiled as possible for all to enjoy!

By making simple changes in our daily routines to reduce water usage, we can all contribute to protecting this precious resource for future generations!

Trash Pickup and Recycling Reminders

Residential trash is collected every Tuesday and Friday. Trash is accepted in 30-gallon cans with lids, cans on wheels, or toters issued by Goode Trash Removal. To guarantee collection, trash should be set out the night before or by 6:00 a.m. on the day of pick-up.

The next quarterly bulk trash pickup dates will be Friday, March 6^{th} and Friday, June 5^{th} . Bulk trash will be collected at the same time as your regular trash, so please ensure all your items are placed at the curb together.

Effective January 7, 2009, the residential recycling pick-up was changed to Wednesdays. To guarantee collection, your recycling tote should be set out the night before or by 6:00 a.m. the day of pick-up. With streamlined recycling, it's easier than ever to recycle your newspapers, phone books, cardboard, glass, plastic, cans, and other approved items. A complete list of acceptable and non-acceptable recyclable items can be found at <u>http://leonardtown.somd.com/services/</u> then clicking on Goode Trash Removal Information.

Town residents wishing to receive further information on Leonardtown trash service, or to obtain a trash or recycling tote, should contact the Town Office.

Look for the Recycling emblem on all your disposables! With the incorporation of single stream recycling and a larger recycling toter, Goode Trash Company reports a heavy increase in Leonardtown's recycling efforts. "Thank You" residents and customers, for making recycling an important part of your daily routine to help save our planet!



Goode Trash Removal will operate on the regular pick-up schedule of Tuesday and Friday for trash, and Wednesday for recyclables, during the weeks containing the President's Day, Memorial Day and Independence Day holiday. For a complete holiday list, please refer to the Town website.

Commercial Customer Recycling

The Town of Leonardtown and Goode Trash Removal now offer comingled recycling service to commercial customers in Leonardtown. Beginning in January 2009, collection service is available every Wednesday. Commercial customers will be provided 96 gallon recycling totes. This is not a free service, and customers will be charged \$4.75 each time your tote is collected. The expected outcome is that your garbage service can be reduced, which would partially offset the recycling fee. Some customers may need service every week; others may need less. You can request more than one tote if you anticipate a large volume of recycling material. If you are interested in this service, call Jackie Post at 301-475-9791 to order your tote and schedule the servicing of your account.
